1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The institution is accredited by NAAC in 2004 and 2011 and awarded B grade in both accreditation. After second accreditation, significant improvements have been made in improving the curriculum particularly some of the improvements have been made on the basis of the feedback from the students. The courses like Tally Advance Excel, Spoken English are regularly being conducted in order to give extra muscle to the students in addition to the curriculum. The teaching is being carried on the merits of students wherein main stress is given for effective learning of students. Group Discussion and Special lectures, workshops, Seminars, Conferences are regularly arranged to make the students understand the changes in the areas of their study keeping in mind the participatory learning system. The Evaluation method is highly transparent wherein local comments are made by the faculty. The Outcome of this is achieving 92% average pass percentage in all the years. A Research centre has been established in 2013 wherein students are pursuing research leading to Ph.D Degrees which is also a significant achievement of the college.

The classroom teaching has been provided through installation of LCD Projectors, Smart Classes etc., The Library has been fully automated with internet and other facilities. The institution is completely computerized with softwares in admission, attendance, IA marks Parent's portal etc., wherein complete transparency is achieved.

Vision

Education is not only a liberating force but also a democratizing force. Education is badly needed to have-nots. Therefore our vision is to provide education to the poor and the needy.

The vision of the college is "Quality and Excellence" in higher education is properly full filled. Almost every year thousands of applications are received for Commerce and Management courses and the number of seats available are 240 for B. Com, 60 for BBA, 60 for BA and 60 for M.Com.

At the time of admission the parents are informed to track the progress of their wards frequently. Software is being used for attendance updates internal assessment marks and SMS's are sent to the parents about these information. Parent's portal is also available where in parents can meet the faculty to know the progress of their wards. Even the admission process is done through software. Student's data base is updated.

Mission

The Mission as accomplished by providing commerce education to make them self-employed and successful entrepreneurs, by providing management education to make them efficient leaders in business organization and finally; by providing Arts education to make them dynamic leaders of the society. The mission is accomplished by effective teaching learning and evaluation mechanism.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The college is located in the heart of the city and easily accessible to railway station,

Private bus stand and one KM away from rural bus stand

- More than 50% of teachers having experience of above 20 years
- Some of the teachers are having MPhil and PhD qualifications and others have NET, KSET cleared
- Highly supportive management
- Financial soundness of institution is very good
- Abundant infrastructure for updating knowledge
- Majority of teachers are having research bent of mind
- ICT enabled class rooms
- Good library facility with infibnet and internet provision is given to faculty and to students
- Provision of laptops to all PG students
- Faculties have been provided laptop to update knowledge through internet and to make ppt,
- Good feeding of students from our own PU collage and puc colleges of nearby areas,
- Use of software for admission, IA marks, attendance and also provision of parental portal,
- Close access with university PG Departments for utilizing their services on the occasions of conference, workshop and seminars.

Institutional Weakness

- Majority students are from rural area
- English language is a barrier particularly for BA Students
- Some of the students are also from urban weaker section and the students are attending the classes after the part time works, hence they may not in a position to devote completely on education
- Though there is a research foundation, expected fund for completing the research projects are not available.
- Only three posts are grant in aid posts and the rest of the teaching faculties and non-teaching faculties being paid by the management, hence there is maximum out flow of cash for salary and lesser portion is available for development.
- Since the college is situated in area where it is inhabited by weaker section of society and not in a position to come along with main stream students

Institutional Opportunity

- More numbers of PU colleges in the surrounding area, hence there will be not be much problems for intake.
- Since the college is located in the place where, it is near to railway station, bus stop, city bus stand and suburb bus stand, the rural students are being easily attracted.
- The teachers who have not completed their NET or KSET are also taking initiative to complete such eligibility criteria to get the requisite academic eligibility.
- Students are having the opportunities of taking admission in the M.Com course in our own institution, especially B.Com, BBM/BBA students can go for MBA in the Vidyavardhaka college of Engineering run by Vidyavardhaka Sangha

- Since the college is located in the educational hub of the Mysore city, abundant academic resources are easily accessible.
- Industrial estates, firms and other organization are located in and around Mysore city and nearby places, hence the students can have access to visit such organization to get hands on experience.
- Ease conducting of the campus placement activities, training activities, skill development activities, etc because of the conglomeration of educational resources.
- The overall development of the students in the area of discipline, personality, commitment, punctuality, promptness, endurance, empathy can be imparted through NCC, NSS, Sports, Nature club, Red-cross wing, Scouts and Guides and also involvement in Kalasambhrama, Commerce and Management fest (Vidwath) and extra co-curricular activities, these are being regularly and actively carried on in the institution

Institutional Challenge

- Inferiority complex in speaking English language is normally seen among the students from rural background and removal of this attitude is a challenge for faculty
- Bringing the economic and social students to the main stream in order to maintain social equality is a big challenge and the faculty is striving a lot to bridge the gap between the rural and urban students and also urban elites and urban poor and weaker section
- The courses offered are all generic in nature, heavy competitions are being faced by the students in the job market from the students of professional courses.
- More than 90% of the faculty are being paid by the management and their salary is not incompatible with UGC teachers hence leading to disparity and some sort of feeling in their minds that “no equal pay and equal work” leading to affecting the morale of the teachers.
- Per capita educational expenditure of the institution is high because of no-grant from the government leading to charging more fee to the students to recover the cost of education, this may be treated as little bit burden on the students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Vidyavardhaka first Grade College is affiliated to university of Mysore, offering three courses namely B.Com, BBA and BA at UG level and M.Com course at PG level. The syllabus of these courses is framed by the University of Mysore. In addition to this add on courses are offered such as Global Skill Enhancement, English Communication Skill, Tally and Advanced Excel etc. MAT, CMAT, NET and SLET Training programmes are conducted to UG and PG students. Apart from this Civil Service Trainings are also conducted in collaboration with KRISHIK foundation trust, Mysore.

The bridge course is conducted for non-commerce students every year. The college has an organization called Nature club which carries field visit to bring awareness among the students about environmental protection issues. As a regular feature of the college, field trip and industrial visits are carried frequently to give them practical experience about the function of the various organizations.

Our institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics into the curriculum. Environmental studies, Business ethics, Indian constitution, GST,

Human resource accounting, E-Commerce, Service management subjects are also included into the curriculum.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The main objective of the institution is to give education to economically weaker section of the society as well as the rural background section. The enrolment percentage for the last 5 years is satisfactory. The institution aims at enhancing, learning capabilities moulding the skills and knowledge of the students. Institution regularly organizes seminars, workshops, special lecturer series by inviting learned resources persons. Industrial visits and conducting of the guidance programs in associations with professional institutes like CA, ICWA, ICSI etc are common features

The institution encourages ICT enabled teaching classes for effective student centric learning procedure. The institution concentrates on slow learners by conducting bridge courses, remedial classes and extra tutorial classes. In order to help to get experience and exposure about the working of the service sectors and NGO's regular institutional visits are being arranged, sometimes students will get the information through workshops conducted in such institution.

Faculties are highly qualified eligible and having research bent of mind in order to adapt to themselves to changed pedagogy. They have full filled the required eligible criteria as per the UGC norms and they are always ready to accept the changes.

The college has well established mechanism pertaining to evaluation and grievances. Continuous internal evaluation is conducted by the subject teachers throughout the semesters. Progress and performance of the student are evaluated and informed to the parents though software

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, innovation and extension exhibits research mobilization with supervision for PhD scholars and innovative research methodologies. In regard to this grants for research project is quite weak stating that the institution has not received non-government funding. It highlights the recognized guides with 2 numbers under which 16 have enrolled and most of the projects are ready to be submitted, among one has submitted the thesis because, the time bound is insufficient. The teachers who are associated with UGC funding agencies have submitted two minor research project. The institution has created number of ecological projects in different terms but not in the form of incubation Centre. The institution consists of courses namely BCOM, BBA, BA and MCOM which are conducting seminars and the intellectual property rights found are in evident. When it comes to research and publication awards, the teachers are regularly identifying with the presenting ratio about 121 papers and these papers are presented in state/national/international level. The number of books published from the local publishers played a very great role in drawing the attention of the academicians. When it comes to extensional activities, students have frequently participated voluntarily in different archeological components and illogical superstitious beliefs are predominantly eradicated through NCC and NSS in which the students are involved in increasing ratio compared to the earlier years. It has created the awareness among the students about their participation in extensional activities. Hence, they are involved in swach bharath , AIDS awareness and gender issues.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The administration of Vidyavardhaka First Grade College fully realizes the importance of infrastructure in the teaching learning process in the modern times and is committed to effective and optimum use of its available infrastructure and continues reduction of infrastructure deficiency in order to facilitate its students. The college administration has been striving towards this objective for many past years. It has considerably increased its physical infrastructure during the past years and is planning to further increase the same in coming years. The institution wants to achieve final goal set by the department of higher education that is (value based qualitative education). VV Sangha and UGC provide funds for developing purposes.

Good number of Books, Journals, Magazines, News Papers procured as per the norms and provide E-Resources, OPAC, Computer with internet Facilities and Wi-Fi facilities to staffs.

College has well equipped computer lab with 75 (desktop) computers for both UG and PG (BCom, BBA, BA and MCom Students) for every PG student laptop provided.

The teachers are encouraged to use ICT Resources in class rooms for transforming the class room teaching to learner centric. The teachers are trained to use these equipment's like computers, internet projectors.

The students are allowed to practice in college premises after 3PM indoor games like Table tennis, Chess and Carrom Board. Outdoor games like kabaddi, Throw ball, Shuttle Badminton, Volleyball.

VV Sangha has entered contract with various agencies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

The institution believes in the 'student centric' form of teaching. The students are provided the utmost benefits. It may be in terms of Infrastructure, Academic help and financial support. Number of scholarships and freeship are provided by both government and the institution during the last five years.

To develop skills among students for both governmental posts and industrial requirements various skill development courses have been introduced like coaching for competitive examinations, career counselling, language lab and such other courses collaborating with the institutions like Negilayogi, NIIT, VETA, etc.,

The institution has taken utmost care of the students in redressing the student grievances like sexual harassment and ragging within the campus. No case has been registered till date in the respective cell.

Many of the passed out students have been placed in various institutions and Industries in the last five years and majority of our students have opted Post Graduate Courses. Number of students have taken the competitive and eligibility tests like SLET, NET, GATE, CAT and GMAT. Students have also participated and have won prizes in National level sports competitions.

The students have been included in the Act of Decision making with their representation in Academic and Administrative committees of the institution.

The institution has got effective Alumni Association and institution has been benefited with very good non-financial contributions. The Pros and cons of the association is very well managed in the annual meeting of the association.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The management insists on a participative way of leadership which includes the total participation and active involvement of both teaching and non-teaching staff for the effective implementation of the vision and mission of the institution. The vision of our college is to provide education to the poor and needy aspirants and mission is accomplished by providing commerce education to make them self-employed and successful entrepreneur, by providing management education to make them efficient leaders in business organization and finally by providing arts education to make them dynamic leaders of the society. The institution has adopted a strategic plans such as quality enhancement, facilitate the students to have continuous learning and improved student success rate. Institution practices decentralization through the principal to the head of the department to faculties of respective departments. The institution has formed various committees for the smooth functioning of curriculum and co-curriculum activities in the college. The committees are NSS, Global enhancement cell, career guidance cell, nature club etc. The institution takes initiative in inviting philanthropists and presents them with the purpose for which funds being utilized and raised. The management of the institution insists on expertise to facilitate creative learning process and discussion are held by the management team with the heads of the department to find out how to take innovations/ innovative ideas for implementation in class room this initiatives are promoted IQAC various measures such as maintaining TQM for first year degree and master degree students, creation of employment opportunities for students etc.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Values are much needed to develop and to be in a healthy society. In the present scenario human generations are facing gaps due to their thinking's and differences in giving importance to particular aspect. It's much required to inculcate and to teach human values to students, so that in future we can have a better union between the people of different groups it may be religion, caste and even profession. The institution plans and organizes number of programs, to bring consciousness about national identities and symbols; Fundamental duties and Rights of Indian citizens and also for promotion of universal values; national values, human values, national integration and to follow communal harmony , so that the students can generate and follow a disciplined life style

- Students are usually taken to industries, the visit to industries induces practical experience and actual working environment to students and also they get benefited by new exposures.
- On behalf of various awareness programmes, the students are led to various service sectors such as, Banks, Insurance companies, Chartered Accountant firms and SSI to make them to understand day-to-day transactions and employment conditions.
- The students were asked to collect cheques, DD challan, different tax returns forms and HR policies in various entities, so that they get first-hand information about such routine transactions.
- Our institution has various tie-ups with different interlink institutions, who regularly conduct various examinations for internship selection. Later, the selected students are provided with internship, technical training to face the industrial life.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

Response:

- Appointment of college internal assessment examination committee.
- Intimation of internal test/assignments time table is given well in advance to students to be prepared. even these information are sent through SMS
- Conducting internal tests frequently at regular intervals which enable students to prepare themselves for the semester exams.
- The test papers are evaluated and if necessary comments are given for the answers written by the students, by the concern teacher. The comments will be local and global in nature. Local means questions specific comments, global comments means overall performance in the test.

- Result analysis of unit tests will be displayed within one week from the date of examination.

- College takes all efforts in teaching students, related to mode and quantum of answers required for different parts, before going to the main examination.
- College conducts group discussion and interaction evaluation once in a month.
- While conducting subject oriented exhibitions the charts and other displayed things, whatever the students make will also be considered for awarding internal assessment marks.

- Make-up tests are also conducted to help the students to make improvements in the internal assessment marks.

- College regularly takes students to industries and educational tours, in order to help students to know more about working and application of theoretical concepts in organizations, through this students get exposure to different cultures of the society.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Response: The College has well established mechanism pertaining to evaluation and grievances. Mechanism is based on the type of grievance.

1. Term end evaluation – Grievances are referred to the Principal and HOD through concerned subject faculty; mentor resolves the grievance based on documentation.
2. Class test, re-test and prelim examinations are held and complaints regarding the same are resolved by respective subject teacher and head of the program.

1. If the student is unable to attend the internals as per the calendar of events given by the College, keeping in concern of the students and in the direction of solving their grievances, retest will be given if the reason is genuine.

1. Any mistakes that occur during uploading IA marks, will be taken care immediately to ensure correctness.

University also has set process of grievances redressal. It is adopted and executed at College level too. This includes.

1. Theory examinations – the queries and complaints about the evaluation are recorded by the

examination section of the college and submitted to university for corrective action. These corrective actions are normally re-evaluation, re-checking, proving photo copy of answers sheet to the student etc.

2. At university level, students can apply for verification, re-evaluation and photo copy of the answer book. The university examiners re-verify, re-assess the answer books and the revised marks if any, are sent to the institute which are communicated to the respective students.
3. In case of delay in issue of admission tickets /marks card by university, specific case works will be assigned to resolve the issue.
4. In case on the date of examination if the student has forget to get / bring the admission ticket to the examination hall, duplicate admission ticket will be issued to ensure that the student is able to write the examination.
5. In case the subjects in the admission ticket is incorrect and name is miss spelt in the marks card the College quickly initiates action to resolve the concern/issue through assigned/ dedicated case worker within the stipulated time.

1. The college takes adequate measures to ensure physically challenged students are allotted ground level rooms for writing exams to avoid inconvenience to them.

1. If the results are withhold from the university the college enquires into the matter and resolves it.

Institution has the vision that “education is not only a liberating force but also a democratizing force. Education is badly needed to have-nots. Therefore our vision is to provide education to the poor and needy” with this vision the institution is regularly thriving to uplift the have-nots, in terms of giving training, empowering and engaging bridge and remedial classes for the poor.

Students were actively involved in community service through various avenues. Students have conducted various awareness programs like:

In 2012-2013, 57 students have camped in Gunnayakanahalli a village near Mysuru and conducted cleanliness drive as well created awareness about health, hygiene and protecting archaeological components.

In the year 2013-14, 80 students, created awareness among the villagers in Katteri village regarding law and illogical superstitious beliefs.

In 2014-15, 110 students in Mantikyathanahalli a village near Mysuru, students have camped for to create awareness about H.I.V, environment and usage of water and epidemic diseases.

In the year 2015, in Badagalahundi village 80 students have created awareness to eradicate consuming liquor.

In 2016, 128 students create awareness among the villagers of Mandyadakoppalu regarding traffic rules

Students of rover crew have conducted aids prevention Jatha in 2014 and community development programme in 2015 our proud rovers walked all the way from Mysuru, K.R. Nagar, Holenarasipura, Shraavanabelegola, Akkihebbal, K.R. Nagar and returned to Mysuru. They covered 161km by walking and creating awareness and arranging road- shows with the topic “Annadhanare Athmahatye Nillisi” in 2016

Students donate blood regularly to the needy as well as to the blood banks which we have tie ups with J.S.S hospital, K.R Hospital and Jeevadhara blood bank. In 2013, 45 units of blood, in 2014 - 52units in 2015 - 43units in 2016 - 48units and in 2017 - 53units of blood has been donated. Apart from this health survey, blood grouping and free eye check-up champs were conducted. Since 2013 nearly 300 students voluntarily took part in maintaining traffic during Jumbo Savari (Dasara) festival. In the year 2017 students have created an organisation naming high hopes to collect poor fund to help the needy. Management has joined hands with the overall improvement of public concern by having a MOU with government organisations entitled “Negilayogi”. A separate office has been set up in the college premises. Institution gives an accommodation with all other class room facilities to conduct coaching classes for U.P.S.C, K.P.S.C and other job aspirants. Regularly classes being held from 5p.m to 8 p.m. in the college premises. By establishing IGNOU an open university in the college premise it helps the general public to get quick access to gain their degrees and other educational activities.

Free summer coaching classes are being conducted by utilizing the Kabbadi court in regular intervals by physical education department for other college P.U and degree students, as the college had won the position under Mysore university Inter-College competitions. This is an event to create an awareness regarding rural sports and uplift the talent students to make them represent universities in inter zonal all India inter universities.

Seminar hall:

College has well equipped Air conditioned seminar hall, is being utilized to conduct seminars, conferences, workshops, induction programs, cultural events and also co-curricular activities like Red Cross, NSS, NCC, nature club, Career guidance cell and college fests.

Part of the seminar hall is also used as special lecturer hall for conducting departmental programs.

Each department has a separate cubical desk provided with desktops and laptops with Wi-Fi facility.

Teaching learning process:

Academic calendar is divided into two semesters, each consisting of 16 weeks. Subject teaching plan is made along with the lesson plans well in advance. Black board teaching, PowerPoint presentations and students interaction strategies are adopted. After completion of each unit (theory/ practical's), unit tests are conducted, corrected and analyzed in front of the student. University Evaluation process is inculcated, each subject is assessed by 100 marks, in total 100 marks 80 marks is assessed by university examination and other 20 marks is allotted to internal assessment . Internal assessment is done in the form of test, seminar, assignment and viva.

Interactive learning:

Teachers takes the students to industrial visit, education tour, special lectures about recent development, institution visit along with education tour is a regular feature of the college.

Progress of the students is monitored through weekly test, unit test. At the end of each semester subjective specific internal evaluation is done. Finally university examination will be conducted and evaluated. College arranges and conducts seminars and special lecture series to impart the knowledge about subject and current scenarios in commerce and management; from 2012 to 2017 the college has excelled in conducting 55 special lecture series, seminars and workshops. Orientation programs for faculties are conducted in the institution to empower and motivate lecturers to perform their job effectively and efficiently.

4.1.2 The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor),gymnasium, yoga centre etc., and cultural activities

The practice session will be held for the student's participation. Every day after 3 p.m. in the college premises. South zone inter-university competitions like Kabbaddi are hosted by the physical department for Kabbaddi, Chess and Cricket. In 2016-17 our final b.com student by name Sanjay Kumar participated in "All India Inter-university Yoga Competition" and won silver medal, thereby brought reputation to University of Mysore and for our college.

7.1.5 Waste Management steps including:

1. A separate solid waste management unit is not placed within the campus due to lack of available space.

2. Within the institution, at the source level the wastes are segregated according to its characteristics like biodegradable, recyclable and reusable waste and then disposed.
3. Biodegradable waste is given to municipal waste collectors, recyclable wastes are sold to recycling industry and reusable wastes are given to respective persons who can reuse it.

1. Within the institution, from the catchment area the rainwater pipelines are connected to the main sump. Filter is fitted at the junction of sump and rainwater pipeline so that the dust and unwanted materials carried through rainwater are filtered and removed.
2. The collected water is utilized for cleaning and gardening purpose.
3. Separate filter is used to filter the water for drinking purpose.
4. As the institution is storing the rainwater, flooding of roads are avoided, increasing demands of water within the institution is met, and even to some extent groundwater is recharged, and also it is supplementing groundwater during lean season.
5. Shortly in future a separate roof top rainwater harvesting system will be implemented, so that the amount of water collected by rain water harvesting system will be accountable and can be used specially during summer season, or when institution face shortage of municipality water, and also institution can reduce the usage of source level water.
6. One of the sister institution is having full-fledged rain water harvesting system; the same concept will be implemented soon.

Response:

1. Bicycles are used by most of the students, the students who bring bicycles are not charged with parking fee. This is mainly to support and inspire students to get bicycles to colleges so that fuel consumption, air pollution and even traffic created by vehicles can be reduced.
2. The institution main vision is to support rural students in their studies, so most of the students who are coming to college are from rural background, rural students are dependent on public transportation, and institution supports the students by giving in time reference letter from the college to get bus passes which will be cheaper than routine bus fares.
3. Not only the students even most of the faculties who come to college uses public transportation.
4. Pedestrian friendly roads are maintained in front of the college, heavy vehicles entry is barred in front of the college, so that students as well as college people can use the front road without any disturbance.
5. Institution maintains full-fledged plastic free campus; awareness is created to students so that they can know the dos and don'ts related to plastic usage.
6. Administration as well as academic section in the campus is full-fledged digitalized keeping in view of less paper usage.
7. Within the campus available soil space is planted with trees and plants, ensured to maintain as a green campus.

This year (2017) inauguration was held at “Green gold farm” owned by industrialist and organic farmer Sri. H.R. Murthy situated in the limits of Kyathanahalli, Gaddige road, H.D. Kote Taluk, Mysuru district on 19th August 2017.

The program was inaugurated by former Member of Parliament and Minister Sri C.H. Vijayashankar by planting trees, function was witnessed by other dignitaries. Sri. H.R. Murthy interacted with the students and also explained importance of soil conservation and benefits of organic farming through demonstration.

In the present scenario especially in India agricultural practices are neglected even though in India 70 percent of people are dependent on agricultural income. Nature Club program is trying to make the students to give importance and to take part in the agricultural activities. Good feedback was given by the students and they expressed how Nature Club made them to understand about agricultural importance. From the program they finally understood how organic farming is healthy and wealthy output.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

As the institution is offering three courses which are generic, the enrollment for is B.Com is considerably high. The modernization of classrooms, provision of facilities and recruiting the well qualified and committed faculty is helping to attract more number of students for this course. The Alumni of the college is also directly and indirectly helping the college in admission, placement and entrepreneurial aspects. The conducting of number of academic and co-curricular activities regularly helping the students to gain leadership qualities and to grow as responsible citizens.

The establishment of the Cells like Anti ragging, grievance redressal, Human atrocities etc., are ensuring safe and secured learning environment.

Considerable academic support is being given to the faculty to write articles, text books and to participate in national and international seminars by providing financial benefits.

The institution is also practicing e-Governance with highly qualitative leadership and management which will help for smooth and effective functioning of the institution. The students have also excelled in sports and National level sports and some of the student have cleared NET and K-SET exams. Majority of the students have been placed in organizations, Govt. offices, Corporates etc., which is really appreciable.
